PRESIDENT'S WELCOME TO CHARTER MEETING

On the occasion of the annual commemoration of Charter Day it is my great pleasure to welcome all those attending Charter 2023 **Shaping The Future** this week at RCSI. We are delighted to be able to meet in person.

RCSI has evolved considerably since its foundation in 1784, set up by Royal Charter, to oversee standards in surgery and regulate surgical training. Today it is an internationally recognised independent, not for profit, university of health sciences institution and the professional training body for surgery in Ireland.

Over the years our Annual Charter Day Meeting has grown to reflect our ever-expanding role and reach as a professional training body. This week's meeting is focused on surgical care and planning for the future. We meet during a time of immense pressure in the Irish health services. These pressures are impacting both on patients and on the health care professionals who, as we know, remain dedicated to their welfare. Our gathering this week gives us the opportunity to reflect on these challenges and provide support to each other.

This year's Charter events begin on Saturday 28 January, with **the Annual Meeting of the Irish Surgical Training Group (ISTG)**. As part of this session, the **Bosco O'Mahony Lecture** will be delivered by **Professor Michael Kerin**, entitled, *Irish Surgery – a discipline in evolution: implications for training and practice*.

The Charter Day Meeting also serves as an opportunity to our **Clinical Programs in Surgery** and the **National Office of Clinical Audit**, or NOCA, to showcase their activities. NOCA is a publically funded independent institution, based in, and supported by the RCSI. This meeting will highlight their key achievements and their future objectives to develop national clinical audit across our healthcare system.

On Tuesday evening we host the **17th Annual** Intercollegiate Case Presentations which is an annual event delivered by the surgical societies of Irish medical schools and I wish the best of luck to all presenters competing for the David Bouchier-Hayes Medal this year.



On Wednesday the Annual Health Service Quality Improvement and Innovations Conference will take place, hosted by RCSI National Clinical Programmes. This will highlight our invited speaker Mary Dixon Woods, Director of THIS Institute (The Healthcare Improvement Studies Institute) and the Foundation Professor of The Healthcare Improvement Studies in the Department of Public Health and Primary Care at the University of Cambridge. Wednesday afternoon will see parallel sessions from our RCSI Faculties. On Wednesday evening we look forward to the 33rd Annual VideoSurgery Meeting.

On Thursday morning we have a plenary Symposium entitled: **'The Future of Surgery and Technology for Surgeons and the Patient'**. This is followed by parallel sessions on Breast, Colorectal, H&N, HPB, Otolaryngology, Urology and Upper GI surgery.

We look forward to the Johnson & Johnson Lecture on Thursday afternoon entitled 'Allies, Advocates and Change Agents' by our guest speaker Dr John G. Meara who joins us from Boston Children's Hospital where he is Plastic Surgeon-in-Chief. He is also Professor of Surgery at Harvard Medical School. Later in the week, Dr Meara will receive an Honorary Fellowship from the RCSI. This will be followed by the 45th Millin Lecture by Prof Shirley Potter, Consultant Plastic and Reconstructive Surgeon, Mater Misericordiae University Hospital, Dublin and Associate Clinical Professor, School of Medicine, University College Dublin. Thursday evening sees Honorary Fellowship conferred on **Dr Vivian McAlister**, Professor Emeritus, University of Western Ontario and Adjunct Professor, Department of History, University of Western Ontario and **Dr. Ajit K Sachdeva**, Director, Division of Education, American College of Surgeons and Adjunct Professor of Surgery, Feinberg School of Medicine at Northwestern University, Chicago.

Friday has a busy schedule with several highlights to look forward to. In the morning we have the **30th Carmichael Lecture 'What Good Looks Like – A Patient Perspective'** with guest speaker **Orla Tinsley**, journalist, campaigner, and multimedia artist.

This year we commemorate the 250th anniversary of the birth of Abraham Colles, RCSI Professor of Surgery in the early 19th century, who described the eponymous Colles fracture, decades before the discovery of x-rays. This year's **98th Abraham Colles Lecture** will be delivered by **Dr Luc Morris**, Associate Director, Immunogenomics and Precision Oncology Platform, Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center.

Across five Symposia on Friday we will have the opportunity to reflect on the key challenges and opportunities in surgical care; from the future of surgical training to future perspective on clinical audit to the configuration and staffing of safe surgical services.

And on Friday evening we have the **Annual Charter Dinner** which this year will include Honorary Fellowship conferred upon **Professor Maria B Majella Doyle**, Professor of Surgery, Division of General Surgery, Sections of Transplant Surgery and Pancreatic, Hepatobiliary and Gastrointestinal Surgery, Washington University School of Medicine and **Professor Richard Irving**, Consultant in Otology, Neurotology and Skull Base Surgery, University Hospital Birmingham NHS Trust, Queen Elizabeth Hospital and Birmingham Children's Hospital, UK and **Dr John G Meara**, Plastic Surgeon-in-Chief, Boston Children's Hospital; Professor of Surgery, Harvard Medical School; Honorary Professorial Fellow, University of Melbourne.

I encourage you all to partake in as many activities as you can during Charter Week. This is an ideal time to reconnect with colleagues you may not have seen in a while and to be inclusive of new colleagues. It is only through supportive and collaborative frameworks that we can truly develop the future of surgery.

I wish to acknowledge the organising committee which includes the teams from the Conference and Events Department, the Communications Department, the Department of Surgical Affairs, and team members from the Office of Development, Alumni Relations and Fellows and Members. I thank all the support services staff in RCSI for their commitment to ensuring the smooth running of the Charter Day Meetings and I thank our Speakers and Chairs for their contribution. I look forward to meeting you all during the week.

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THE RCSI ROYAL CHARTER

In 1765 Sylvester O'Halloran, a surgeon from Limerick, had proposed a College of Surgeons in Ireland along the lines of the College de St. Cosme in Paris, which had been regulating French surgery since its creation by Royal Charter by Louis IX in 1255. O'Halloran called for a college of surgery to be founded in Dublin to train, educate and examine persons in the art of surgery. This led to a group of Dublin surgeons joining together and forming the Dublin Society of Surgeons in 1780. The main goals of the society were to separate surgeons from the Barber Surgeons Guild and provide surgical training, education and regulation in Ireland. They lobbied for a Royal Charter in 1781 and presented the Lord Lieutenant with their petition. The Lord Lieutenant presented the petition to King George III who saw it fit to grant a Royal Charter on 11 February 1784 establishing the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland. The first President was Samuel Croker-King (1728-1817) and the first Professor of Surgery was William Dease (1752-1798).

2023 BOSCO O'MAHONY LECTURER



Professor Michael Kerin

Michael Kerin is Chair of Surgery at the National University of Ireland, Galway and Director of the Cancer Managed Clinical Academic Network (MCAN) for Saolta University Health Care Group. As Consultant Surgeon he has a special interest in breast and endocrine cancer. He is Research Director of the National Breast Cancer Research Institute, Principal Investigator with the SFI funded Precision Oncology Ireland, the All Island Cancer Research Institute (AICRI) and co-investigator of numerous other collaborative cancer research initiatives. Professor Kerin's research interests include molecular profiling in cancer, cancer risk prediction and innovative methods for breast cancer diagnosis and management.

JOHN BOSCO O'MAHONY (1948 - 2008)

Mr John Bosco O'Mahony FRCSI MRCP (UK) was one of the longest serving members of the Council of RCSI, being elected by his peers for almost twenty years consecutively. His untimely death on the 29th July 2008 left a void for the College, where he served on Council since 1989, and for the people of Wexford, where he was Consultant Surgeon since July 1984 in Wexford General Hospital. Bosco was a man of exceptionally high intelligence as proved by his many personal and academic achievements. He was Head-boy and Gold medalist at Rockwell College and won a scholarship to study medicine in University College Dublin, graduating in 1972. He completed his internship at St Vincent's University Hospital and was awarded his MRCP (UK) before concentrating on his career in surgery. His post graduate training took him to St Thomas's Hospital in London and subsequently to Brigham and Women's Hospital and Harvard University in Boston USA, where he completed his research training. His greatest legacy will be his human touch. He understood people and their needs and worked extremely hard over the years in his profession. He was a great teacher and mentor of his junior colleagues and developed many long standing relationships with his trainees. He was awarded the Silver Scalpel in 2007 by the Higher Surgical Trainees in recognition of his talents.

RCSI PROGRESS WOMEN IN SURGERY FELLOWSHIP SUPPORTED BY OLYMPUS MEDICAL

The College has been at the forefront in developing transparent selection future surgeons. Evidence shows that gender diversity within organisations results in better decision making. In 2017 RCSI published a comprehensive report PROGRESS: Promoting Gender Equality in Surgery, which made recommendations to ensure that Surgery as a profession is an attractive and practical career for both men and women. The RCSI PROGRESS Women in Surgery (WiS) Fellowship, funded by Olympus Medical through an educational grant, is a prestigious bursary awarded to promote female participation in surgical training at fellowship level.

The 2023 WiS is awarded to **Dr Evelyn Murphy**, together with the RCSI PROGRESS Fellowship Medal. The funding will assist towards the cost of her Fellowship, in Minimally Invasive Surgery and Orthopaedic Foot and Ankle Fellowship, Australia.

THE BRIAN LANE MEDAL 2022

The winner of the prestigious Brian Lane Medal 2022 is **Ms Phoebe Lyons**. Towards the end of year one of Core Surgical Training each May, the 80 first year trainees complete an operative surgical skills assessment (OSCE) and the highest scoring trainee is awarded the 'Brian Lane' Medal in honour of Brian E. Lane FRCSI, FRCSEd, FRCSEng, FACS, Surgeon Prosector and a former Consultant General and Gastro-intestinal Surgeon at Beaumont and Connolly Hospitals.

PROFESSOR W.A.L. MACGOWAN MEDAL 2022

This is an award to recognise the highest performing candidate in the Intercollegiate Specialty examination across all specialties from the RCSI National Training Programmes. The 2022 recipient is **Ms Jessie Elliot** from the May 2022 sitting of the FRCS part 2 in General Surgery.

GERALD O'SULLIVAN MEDAL

The Gerald O'Sullivan medal is awarded every year to the Fellow who graduates top of the class at the annual COSECSA (College of Surgeons of East, Central and Southern Africa) exams. The medal is named in honour of the former President of RCSI, Professor Gerald (Gerry) O'Sullivan, who along with Professor Krikor Erzingatsian, set up the partnership between RCSI and COSECSA in 2007. This partnership aims to help train and retain surgeons in sub-Saharan Africa, and make better surgery accessible to more patients. In this region, the ratio of surgeons to population is 1.8:100,000 thus far below the 20:100,000 ratio recommended by the Lancet Commission. This partnership is funded by Irish Aid, Department of Foreign affairs, and is coordinated by RCSI. To date, COSECSA has graduated 778 surgeons, over 90% of whom are practicing in Africa. The medal has been awarded every year since 2012. Previous winners have been from Kenya and Zimbabwe. The medal winner for 2021 is **Dr Tasimbanashe Masamha**, and the medal winner for 2022 is **Dr Natalie Umugwaneza**.

Orla Tinsley is an award-winning writer, educator, producer and activist.

Orla's motivational speeches are regularly sought in Ireland and abroad, and they have given talks at NYU, Fordham University, Columbia University and the Irish Center NY.

They have received awards including Medical Journalist of the Year, Tatler Magazine's Woman of the Year, National Young Person of the Year and the American Ireland Funds "Spirit of Ireland" award.

At the age of 18, Orla began writing and speaking in national media about healthcare injustice for people with cystic fibrosis in Ireland. They are passionate about social justice and education access, and have an MFA from Columbia University where they began teaching Creative Writing in 2018.

They received the Human Rights Award from The Bar of Ireland for their work on organ donation and the lifetime achievement award of the President's Medal for Storytelling from the Public Institute of Ireland.

Their first creative nonfiction book, SALTY BABY, became an instant best-seller and was nominated for Best Newcomer at the Irish Book Award. Orla's work is also featured in the Junior and Leaving Certificate English textbooks.

WARRIOR, their documentary about their double lung transplant, was nominated for a New York Film and TV Award and inspired over 10,000 people to sign up to be organ donors.

Their work has been published in The Irish Times, Small Orange Journal, The Irish Independent and The Wall Street Journal.

Orla currently works as an Arts Journalist and teaches workshops in Creative Nonfiction at The Irish Writers Centre.

Luc is a surgeon-scientist at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Centre in New York. In his clinical practice, he provides surgical care for patients with tumours of the head and neck, including squamous, salivary, and thyroid cancers and melanomas, and is a member of multi-disciplinary airway reconstruction and surgical critical care teams. He heads a US National Institutes of Healthfunded research laboratory (Crito, Collaborative for Research in Immunogenomics and Translational Oncology), which studies the interface between cancer genetics and immune surveillance in multiple cancer types by integrating genomics, computational, molecular and animal modelling techniques. He is an active member of the NRG oncology cooperative group, the American Society for Clinical Oncology, the editorial boards of JNCI, Cancer, Thyroid and JAMA Otolaryngology, and is the Program Director of the Fellowship in Head and Neck Oncologic Surgery at MSK, the largest clinical fellowship program in North America training head and neck surgeons from around the world.




Dr Vivian McAlister

Vivian McAlister was born in Dublin and educated in Castleknock College and Trinity College. He emigrated to Canada in 1981. Currently Dr. McAlister is professor emeritus at Western University and an adjunct professor in its department of history. He is president of the James IV Association of Surgeons (Canadian section). Formerly, he was a general surgeon with expertise in transplantation and military medicine. He has been president of the Canadian Society of Transplantation and the Canadian Organ Replacement Registry. Dr McAlister served on the council of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada and was chair of its Region Advisory Committee for Ontario and Nunavut (RAC 3). He was co-editor-in-chief of the Canadian Journal of Surgery from 2013 until 2019. He was a regular force member of the Royal Canadian Medical Service, Canadian Armed Forces until 2019 and he has deployed overseas many times. He was the founding director of Western's Office of Military Academic Medicine. Awards received include The Queen Elizabeth Diamond Jubilee medal (2012), the Angus McLachlin chair of surgery (2014); the Canadian Medical Association John McCrae Memorial Medal (2019) and the Canadian Society of Transplantation lifetime achievement award (2019). Dr McAlister was made an officer in the Order of Canada in the 2021 Honours List.

Dr Sachdeva is the Founding Director of the American College of Surgeons (ACS) Division of Education. He is also Adjunct Professor of Surgery at Northwestern University Feinberg School of Medicine. Dr. Sachdeva previously served as Leon C. Mr Josh Burke

Surgical Trainee, Past President ASiT; Current Chair RCS RADAR Trainees Group; Lead author of the Future of Surgery Technology Enhanced Surgical Training Report

Josh is a RCS England and Bowel Cancer UK PhD Clinical Research Fellow at The University of Leeds and a General Surgery Registrar at Leeds Teaching Hospitals NHS Trust. After graduating from The University of Manchester in 2015 he completed his Academic Foundation training in East London whilst completing an honorary research fellowship at the National Institute of Bowel Research, a postgraduate certificate in medical education and a postgraduate diploma in health research. He chaired the Commission on Future of Surgery: Technology Enhanced Surgical Training, is the current Director of Education for The RCS England Innovation Hub, the Vice Chair of The Academy Trainee Doctors Group and previous ASiT President.



Professor Siobhan Glavey, MB BCh BAO BSc PhD FRCPath FRCPI

Chair and Professor of Pathology RCSI; Consultant Haematologist, Beaumont Hospital, Dublin

Professor Siobhan Glavey is the academic head of the Department of Pathology at the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland. She is a haematologist and a physician scientist focused on multiple myeloma and she leads a research group at RCSI focused on precision medicine for this disease. She is the academic lead for the Molecular Pathology Laboratory at RCSI, which is a nationally accredited laboratory for cancer genomics and provides national MRD testing for myeloma patients in Ireland.

She received her medical degree from NUI, Galway and completed her internal medical training at Galway University Hospital and at the Mayo Clinic College of Medicine. Her haematology clinical training took place in Ireland and the USA. She is a Fellow of the Royal College of Pathologists in Ireland and the Royal College of Physicians in Ireland and is a member of EMN, EHA and ASH and the Royal College of Pathologists in London.

Her research focuses on understanding the mechanisms of tumour progression in the bone marrow microenvironment and predicting mechanisms of therapy resistance in multiple myeloma. She is interested in the development of new genomic molecular markers that predict outcomes in multiple myeloma, particularly extramedullary disease relapse. She leads a number of investigator initiated and industry-sponsored clinical and translational research projects in Ireland.

Prof Glavey has co-authored over 100 publications and book chapters and she has received funding support from the American Society of Hematology, Breakthrough Cancer Research and the Leukaemia Research Foundation. She continues to collaborate with a number of leading multiple

Dr McVeigh trained in Clinical Genetics in Ireland, funded by the HRB National Academic SpR programme. She undertook fellowships in Yale University (USA) QIMR Berghofer (Brisbane, Australia), and in the Royal Marsden in London before taking a permanent post as a Consultant Clinical Geneticist there in 2018. She has a specialist interest in Medical Education, and works as member of faculty on MSc Health Professions Education (Iheed/ Warwick University) and PGDip Health Sciences, Clinical Education (NUI Galway). She designed, developed and is Clinical Lead of the Postgraduate Certificate in Cancer Genetics & Genomics, and Subject Matter Expert for the Postgraduate Certificate in Digital Health & Telemedicine, both with the RCPI. She is a tutor on MSc Genomic Medicine (Imperial College London), is a member of steering committee of the Association of Cancer Physicians/Royal College of Radiologists Genomics Education Resource, and co-chairs the Oncogenomics & Malignant Haematology working groups of the Health Education England GeNotes resource. Dr McVeigh is a Council Member and Communications Representative of the Cancer Genetics Group (CGG) of the British Society of Genomic Medicine (BSGM); and is the CGG representative on the BSGM Education & Training working group. She is team leader of Cancer Genetics Education & Quality Improvement team in the Institute of Cancer Research.



Dr Ozanan Meireles, MD

Bariatric and Gastrointestinal Surgeon Assistant Professor of Surgery Harvard Medical School Director, Surgical Artificial Intelligence and Innovation Laboratory

Dr. Ozanan Meireles is an Assistant Professor of Surgery at Harvard Medical School and a Bariatric, Foregut, and Advanced Endoluminal Surgeon at the Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston. Dr. Meireles has been practicing surgery at MGH for more than 10 years, where he has been responsible for the introduction of new technologies and techniques. Dr. Meireles graduated from the Sao Paulo State University School of Medicine in Brazil. He completed his surgical training at Michigan State University and his clinical fellowship in Minimally Invasive and Bariatric Surgery at the University of California San Diego. He spent his research fellowship at the Johns Hopkins Hospital investigating augmented reality in surgery, robotic telemanipulation, and Natural Orifices Trans Endoluminal Surgery (NOTES). He is the director of the Surgical Artificial Intelligence and Innovation Laboratory (SAIIL) at the Massachusetts General Hospital. At SAIIL, his research focus is on utilizing computer vision to investigate the intraoperative phase of care through real-time, automated surgical analysis and provide surgeons with additional data, with the goals of democratization of surgical knowledge, lowering costs, improving patient outcomes, and reduction of morbidity and mortality. He serves as the Chairman of the Society of American Gastrointestinal and Endoscopic Surgeons (SAGES) Artificial Intelligence Task Force, where he has been leading several projects to research and build the foundation for the scalability and sustainability of Surgical AI.



Professor Vassilios Papalois MD, PhD, FICS, FEBS, FRCS

Vassilios Papalois is Professor of Transplantation Surgery and Consultant Transplant and General Surgeon at the Hammersmith Hospital, Imperial College, London, UK. He leads transplant programmes of excellence focusing on high risk and extended criteria kidney and pancreas transplantation.

He has been active in surgical research for more than 30 years and has published more than 200 papers in peer review journals (receiving more than 500 citations per year internationally), 22 book chapters and 8 books. His research focuses on pre-transplant assessment and reconditioning of marginal kidney and pancreas grafts, use of stem cells for treatment of chronically scarred allografts, surgical education, clinical ethics, medico-legal challenges, and health policy.

He is the President of the European Union of Medical Specialists (UEMS) representing 41 countries and 1.6 million medical specialists, the Past-President of the European Society of Organ Transplantation (ESOT), Past-Member of the Executive Board of the Association of Surgeons of Great Britain and Ireland (ASGBI), Member of Council of the European Society of Surgery (ESS), Editor in Chief of the World Journal of Transplantation (WJT), NIHR NW London Subspecialty Lead for Transplantation, Advisor to the General Medical Council (GMC), Advisor to the National Institute of Health and Care Excellence (NICE), Head of student conduct for Imperial College, and member of the editorial board of 11 international peer review journals. Professor Papalois is also Chair of the Ethics Committee of the Avon and Somerset Constabulary and Vice-Chair of the Research Ethics Committee of the Ministry of Defence. Professor Papalois has been a keynote speaker in more than 150 national and international congresses.

Professor Papalois has been awarded a Silver National Award for Clinical Excellence by the UK Department of Health, a Senior Clinical Investigator Award by the European Society of Organ Transplantation, and a Teaching Excellence Award by Imperial College. He has also been awarded an Honorary Doctorate from the University of Thessaloniki and he is an Honorary Member of the Spanish Association of Surgeons and the Spanish Transplantation Society, the only UK surgeon to have both accolades. Professor Papalois is the Deputy President of the Onassis Cardiothoracic Centre and co-chairs the Committee for the National Transplant Plan and Centre in Greece led by the Onassis Foundation.

Associate Professor, Department of Surgery, Trinity College Dublin at Tallaght Hospital; National Clinical Advisor in General Surgery to the National Clinical Programme; President & Chair of Examinations, UEMS Division of General Surgery; RCSI Council Member

Paul Ridgway is a Consultant in General, UGI and HPB Surgery and an Associate Professor in Trinity College Dublin. His research interest are Surgical performance and Education. Dr. Meara serves as the Plastic Surgeon-in-Chief of the Department of Plastic & Oral Surgery at Boston Children's Hospital. He was Co-Chair for the Lancet Commission on Global Surgery and was a commissioner on the Lancet Global Health Commission on High Quality Health Systems in the SDG Era, the Lancet Oncology Commission and the Lancet Commission on Diagnostics.

Professor Alex Bottle Professor of Medical Statistics at Imperial College London

He is Professor of Medical Statistics at Imperial College London. Following involvement in two UK public inquiries, including secondment to the inquiry into the crimes of the GP Harold Shipman, he devised and set up a national hospital outcome monitoring system with his Unit's commercial partners Dr Foster. This system soon detected the high mortality at Mid Staffordshire and helped trigger another public inquiry and a wider review of in-hospital deaths, and it continues to this day helping hospitals improve their outcomes. His research focuses on the use of primary care and hospital data to investigate variations in the quality of care for long-term conditions such as heart failure and arthritis and has been cited in clinical guidelines and the 2019 NHS Long-term Plan. He has worked with clinicians from nearly 20 specialties, including orthopaedics, upper and lower GI surgery, and urology. He is an editor at Thorax and BMJ Quality and Safety. In addition to his teaching responsibilities, since 2016 he has run a popular training course for the public sector in statistical thinking and better use of data, with clients including teams at the UK's Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency, the Welsh Assembly and many local authorities.


