In July 2015, I commenced a one year clinical fellowship at Weill Cornell Medical College / New York Presbyterian hospital in New York. Under the guidance of renowned international experts, including Dr. Alexis Te, Dr. Steven Kaplan and Dr. Jerry Blaivas, this fellowship encompassed female and male voiding dysfunction issues, in particular the surgical management of female incontinence, pelvic organ prolapse repair, post prostatectomy male incontinence, urethral reconstruction and the management of benign prostatic hyperplasia. I gained experience in novel treatments for the management of these conditions and had the opportunity to use the latest technology available. The fellowship allowed me to build on the excellent training I received in Ireland and gain significant experience in my subspecialty of choice in a world-renowned centre under the guidance of internationally recognised experts. The fellowship also afforded me the experience to participate in novel research projects, which I had the opportunity to present at international meetings and publish in specialty peer reviewed journals.
