## Summary (no more than 250 words)

I was the Upper Limb fellow for 12 months in Christchurch, New Zealand. The fellowship is spread out over Christchurch Public Hospital, Burwood Elective Hospital and a couple of the private hospitals around the city. It is the tertiary referral centre for the South Island for complex shoulder and elbow conditions. I mainly worked with 3 experienced upper limb surgeons surgeons. The week is split into 10 half day sessions. Most weeks comprise of 6 or 7 theatre sessions, 2 or 3 clinic sessions and 1 free session for research. Theatre sessions can often go up until 8pm. Theatres in both private and public are run pretty efficiently and in one half day session it's possible to get 5-6 cases done. There is a good mix of cases with a high volume of arthroscopic rotator cuff repair and labral repair being done. There was a significant amount of shoulder arthoplasty being done also. I carried out research looking at medium term follow-up (5 to 9 years) of arthroscopic rotator cuff repair using the tension band technique and I will present my findings at SESA meeting in Perth in November 2018.

- 2. Become proficient in all types of shoulder arthroplasty and specifically reverse geometry arthroplasty.
